This week's theme is: British Wildlife




















Beatrix Potter

'I wonder if, like me, you were brought up with the enchanting books of Beatrix Potter, the most famous of which is 'The Tale of Peter Rabbit'. She was an English writer, illustrator, natural scientist and conservationist, best known for her children's books about animals. She was educated by governesses and grew up isolated from other children. She spent holidays in Scotland and the Lake District, developing a love for landscape, flora and fauna. She wrote 30 books, and from the proceeds and a legacy from an aunt, she bought Hill Top Farm in the Lake District. When she died, aged 77, she left almost all her property to the National Trust.' - Pauline

Recall of the Wild

Lockdown has been very good for some wildlife. Cuckoos, falcons and even killer whales have been spotted venturing into new areas of land and sea, after becoming emboldened by the peace and quiet of lockdown. Peregrine falcons are nesting in the ruins of Corfe Castle in Dorset, partridges wander in an empty car park in Cambridge and a cuckoo is calling at Osterley in West London. Killer whales were spotted last Friday in County Down Northern Island, whilst albino badgers have been seen in Cliveden, Berkshire. Not all creatures have enjoyed the lockdown however with peacocks at Powys castle in Wales now following the gardeners around in the absence of visitors, whilst the jackdaws at Ham House, who enjoy feeding off scraps of food dropped by people, have not returned to the historic property since the lockdown started.

Though pets aren't wild animals, we wanted to acknowledge them this week, particularly to honour their companionship during lockdown.


Marion


